As early peoples crossed the Taiwan Strait—called the "black trench" in their time—and came to cultivate barren lands, they spread their roots from the coastal regions inland. For four centuries, the great powers of Asia, Europe, and America all influenced Taiwan in different ways and at different periods. Like crashing waves launching spray along the shore, these cultures impacted far-reaching corners of the island, culminating in an unstoppable flow of history. Through regime changes and the coming together of peoples, the circumstances of history gave birth to a diversified maritime culture, seen in fishing, cuisine, villages, coastlines, navigation, seafaring vessels, maritime power, literature, art, customs, festivals, and more, all offering a rich illustration of maritime Taiwan.



Its distinctive maritime culture sets Taiwan apart on the world stage. In this exhibition, people's unique relationship with the ocean is traced through exhibits and research from the National Museum of History and the Shihsanhang Museum of Archaeology in New Taipei City. Diverse artworks and ancient artifacts alike call out to us using the vocabulary of the sea. Visitors can experience the birth of islands, the evolution of nature, and the unfolding of history through archeological findings such as fishing equipment. They can experience the roles and perspectives of art in a maritime society through photography, oil and ink wash painting, pottery, and wood carving. They can see the
